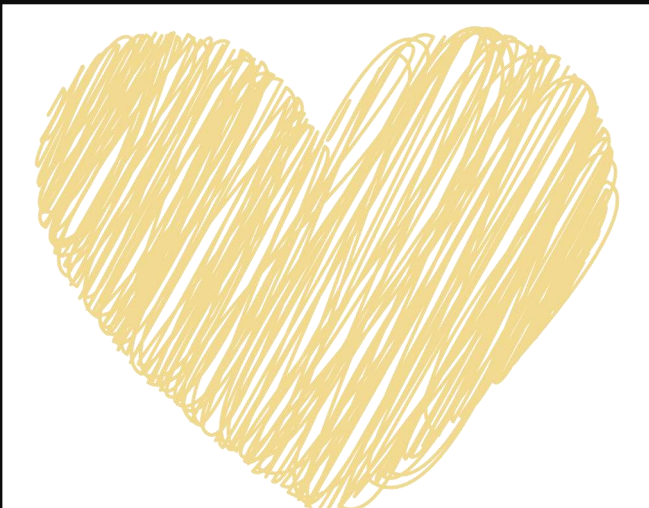

A MESSAGE FROM THE CEO



Sun Street Centers remains open to the public throughout our current pandemic, as an essential health care provider. State and Federal statistics for 2020 show 30% increase in **reported** substance abuse and mental illnesses, impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic on our lifestyles and overall health for youth and adults. No one is left unchanged. Sun Street Centers' statistics for July 2020 through June 2021 indicate we served and educated **9,761** people. This is consistent with the numbers of people we serve annually however our success rates show a 20% decrease in effectively achieving long term recovery or behavioral change. This is the impact of COVID-19. Effects of isolation, financial stressors, lack of work or schooling, health crises, have torn at the fabric of

many families. Compounded with the struggle of recovering from years of alcoholism or drug addiction, it has been difficult for our clients to complete program or to have a source of supports when they leave program. Our youth have not been fully engaged in school or extracurricular activities, and underage alcohol and drug abuse has increased beyond 30%; overdoses, for teens and adults have more than doubled as **fentanyl** products continue to infiltrate all kinds of street drugs. The good news is that we are here, doors open, professional, caring, committed staff willing to help. Across our various program/strategies, we have seen 33%-80% success rates. Prevention, treatment, and recovery supports do work. Families are reuniting, students are making healthy choices. Sun Street Centers' amazing staff continue to save lives every day, working with our partners from **county health departments, law enforcement, hospitals, schools, nonprofits, faith-based and 12-step communities**, we still see recovery happening every day! On behalf of our hard-working and dedicated **Board of Directors**, please enjoy our program highlights for 2020-21.

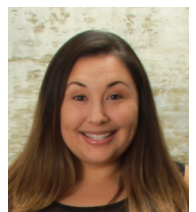

Preventing alcohol and drug addiction by offering education, prevention, treatment and recovery to individuals and families regardless of income level.

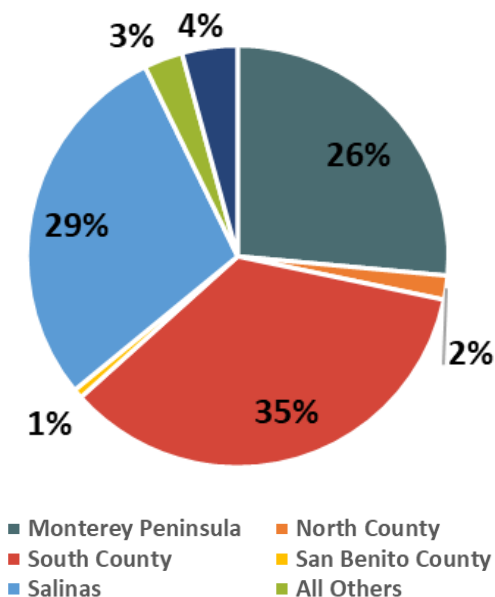

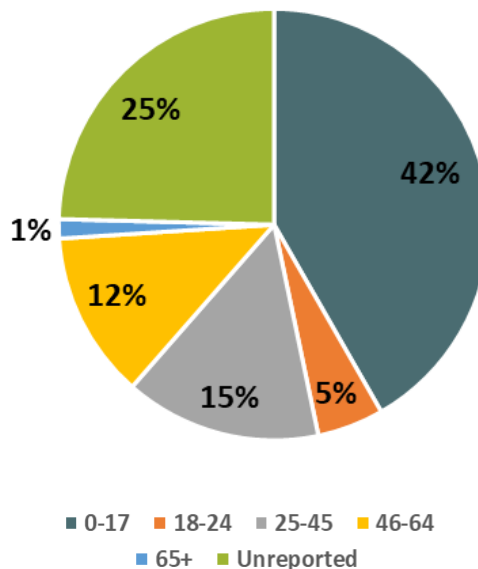

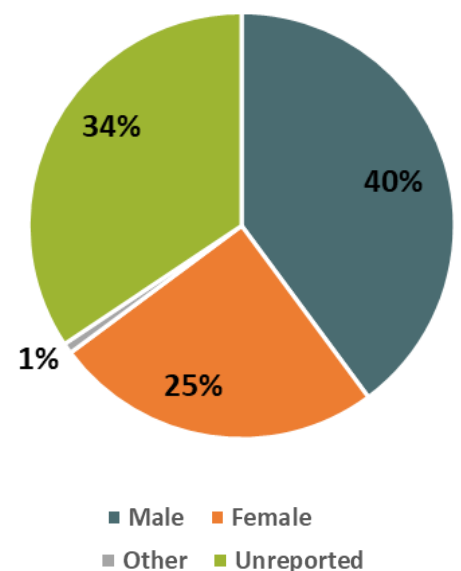

COLLABORATIONS & VOLUNTEERS

Each year, Sun Street Centers counts the number of inter-agency collaborations. as a requirement for one of its funding sources. Through these cooperative activities, Sun Street Centers not only shares its resources and expertise with other agencies, it also receives comparable, low-cost/high quality support from them and, thereby, expands its ability to serve its own clients. This past year, we were part of **732** collaborations.

A total of **9,453 volunteer hours** were completed through community activities, **886 volunteer hours** were donated to agency activities, and our board and volunteer committees completed **804 volunteer hours**.

The Family Recovery Program at Pueblo del Mar (PDM) worked with **Monterey County Behavioral Health, Housing Authority for the County of Monterey, and Monterey County Department of Social Services** to provide a safe, affordable, transitional housing program for homeless women with children, men with children, and families with children.

Collaboration is key when it is time to make change. With support and partnership from agencies like **Coalition of Homeless Services Providers, Workforce Development Board, Arts Council for Monterey County, Monterey Peninsula Unified School District (MPUSD), Soil Cycle Monterey Bay** and many more, clients received resources and skills sets to prepare them for employment and housing. Pueblo Del Mar had **80%** of clients successfully complete the program. Families that successfully complete the program; find permanent housing, continue on with their education, find employment and are reunited with their families.

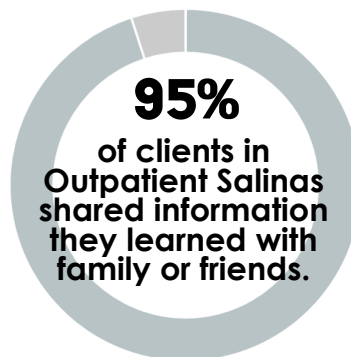
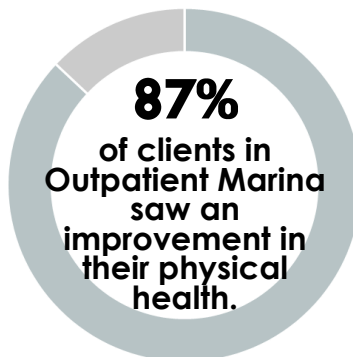
OUTPATIENT RECOVERY SERVICES

Outpatient Recovery Services proudly served 278 clients with half of them being **self-referred**. Other referral sources include; 54 from **Substance Abuse and Crime Prevention Act/Probation**, 21 from **Assembly Bill 109** (AB 109), and 19 from the **Drug Court**.

Based on client demographics, **55%** of clients identify as Hispanic and a **61%** of the total clients served were between the ages of 25-44 years old. Residence area of clients show that **39%** are from Salinas, **28%** from Monterey Peninsula, **26%** from South County, **1%** from North County, **5%** from outside Monterey County and **1%** went unreported. **44%** of clients successfully completed the program.

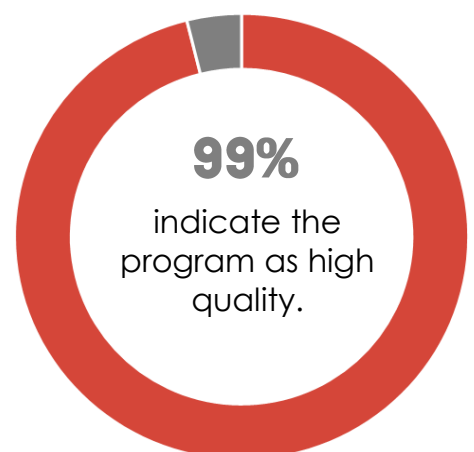
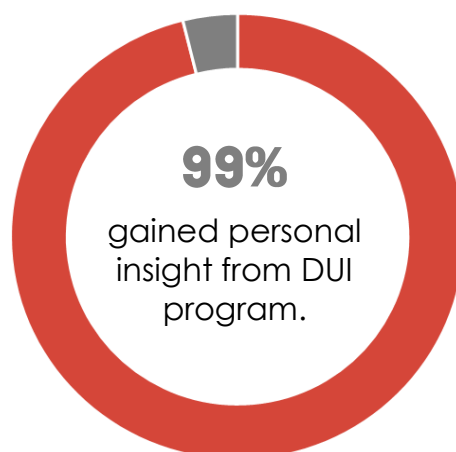

The DUI Education program proudly served 1,672 clients (**80% male, 20% female**) with half of clients being between ages **45-64 years**. **56%** of clients successfully completed the program.

This program is licensed by the State of **California Department of Health Care Services (DHCS), Substance Use Disorder Compliance Division**, and **Driving Under the Influence Unit** to provide quality education and counseling to help the participant understand his/her relationship with alcohol and drugs, and the inherent risk of driving while under the influence.



CLIENT TREND, SUBSTANCE OF INFLUENCE:

A total of 1,310 of clients (78%) reported that **alcohol** was their substance of influence.



Based on client demographics, **57%** are from Salinas, **18%** from South County, **15%** Monterey Peninsula, **8%** from North County, and **2%** from outside the county.





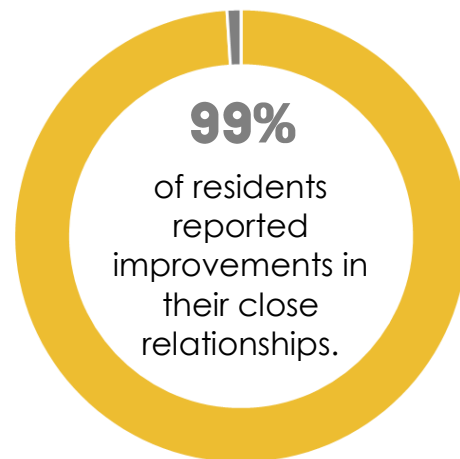
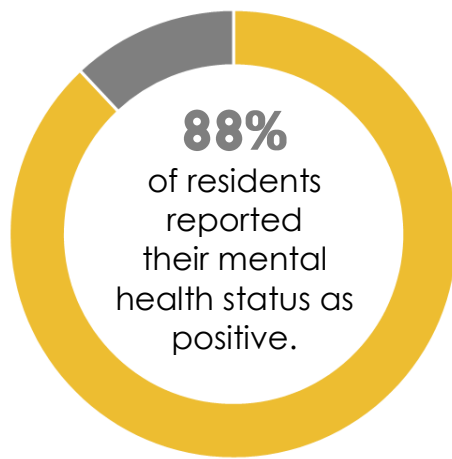
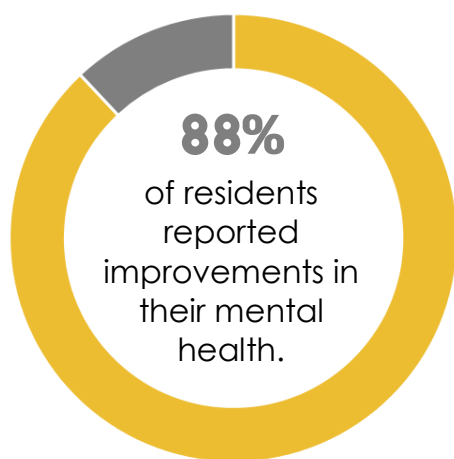
MEN'S RESIDENTIAL

Men's Residential Program in Salinas proudly served 320 residents with **48%** being referred by **Medi-Cal** from different counties. Additional referral sources include; **private insurance** and **self referrals**. This residential program saw at least **62%** of beds filled with **97%** of residents indicating that quality of the program was high. Resident demographics show that **41 residents** are ages 18-24, **191 residents** are 25-45, **80 residents** are 45-64, and **8 residents** are over 65 years of age.

Half of the residents stated that they were from the Salinas area with **48%** of total residents identifying as Caucasian/White, **36%** as Hispanic, **8%** as African American, **2%** as Asian, **1%** as American Indian, **1%** as Pacific Islander and **4%** as other. **33%** of residents successfully completed the program.

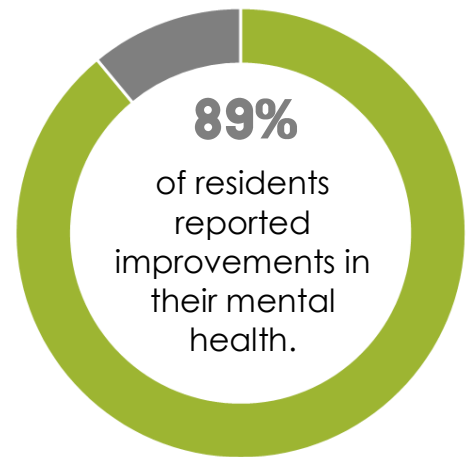
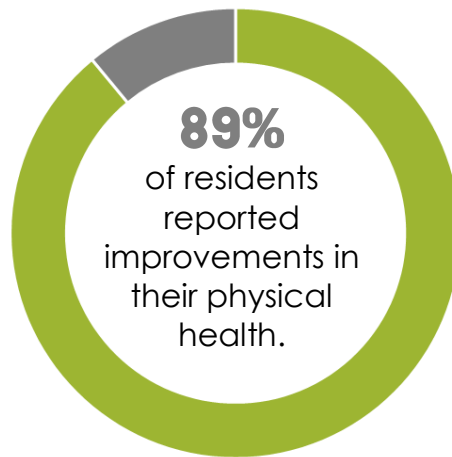
WOMEN'S RESIDENTIAL



Women's Residential Program in Hollister proudly served 69 residents with **80%** being referred by **Medi-Cal** from different counties. Additional referral sources include; **private insurance** and **self referrals**. This residential program saw at least **78%** of beds filled with **94%** of residents indicating that quality of the program was high. Resident demographics show that **22%** are ages 18-24, **52%** are 25-45, and **26%** are 45-64 with over half identifying as Caucasian/White.

This program reported at least **78%** of beds filled with **94%** of residents indicating that quality of the program was high. The great **leadership** from staff and the **determination** from residents to stay alcohol and drug-free created a safe environment for the women to get back on the road to sobriety. Based on surveys from 27 residents, **96%** stated they worked together with a staff member to create a plan and implement treatment goals. **92%** of the residents stated that the services they received were helpful to them with their sobriety and they felt comfortable asking questions about their treatment plan. **47%** of residents successfully completed the program.

PRIMARY DRUG OF CHOICE: Primary drug of choice for this program based on residents responses; 47% said **alcohol**, 28% said **stimulants**, 20% said **Opioids**, and 5% said **RX drugs**.





KING CITY RESIDENTIAL

The Men and Women Residential Program in King City proudly served **131 residents**. Located in Downtown King City, this program provides a supportive environment for men and women who are seeking freedom from the devastating effects of drug and alcohol addiction. Counselors are on hand 24/7 and can help recovery participants incorporate the principles of **Social Model recovery**.

62% of residents are being referred from **Prop 47** and **Medi-Cal**. Additional referral sources include; **probation** and **private insurance**. This residential program saw at least **60%** of beds filled with **73%** of residents indicating that quality of the program was high.

100% of the residents reported to be at or below poverty level. For this residential site, **50%** of residents successfully completed the program.

WOMEN: Half of the women in the program were between the ages of 25-45. The women volunteered in King City, completing **364 volunteer hours**.

MEN: A **60%** of the men in the program were between the ages of 25-45. A total of **574 volunteer hours** were completed by the men in the program.

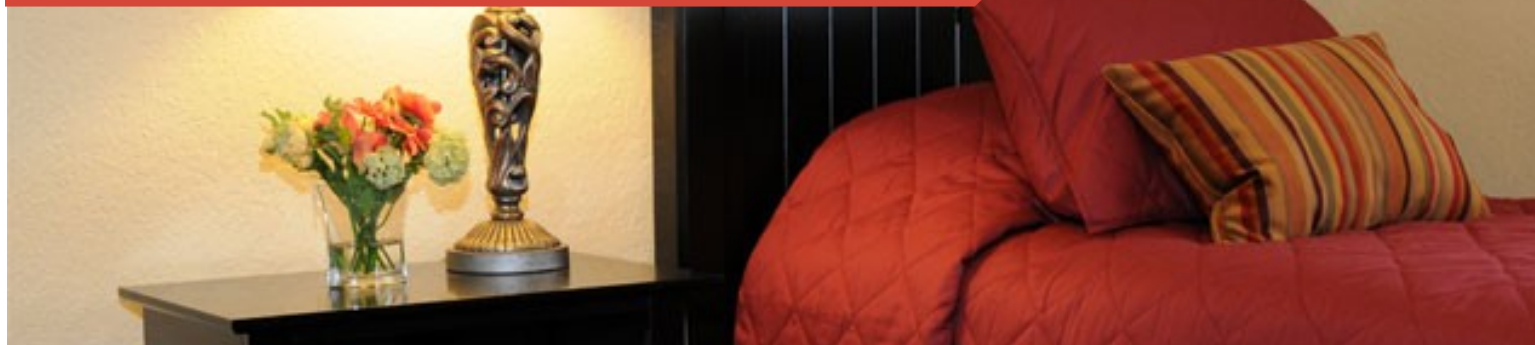

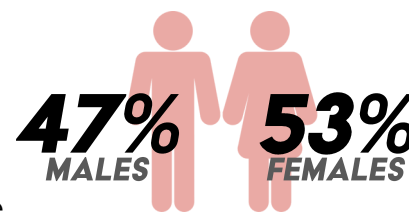
SOBER LIVING ENVIRONMENTS



Sobering Living Environments (SLE) throughout Monterey County proudly served 43 residents (**47%** male, **53%** female). SLE's are structured to implement everything our residents have acquired in treatment, through the twelve-step recovery process. Residents agree to a **Sober Living** Covenant designed to develop character, self-esteem, responsibility, self-reliance, and accountability in order to help in the process of **rebuilding a life**.

Based on resident demographics, 1 is from **Monterey Peninsula**, 1 from **North County**, 6 from **South County**, 7 from **Salinas**, 21 from outside **San Benito County** and 2 went unreported. The average SLE resident was an older individual. For instance, **70%** of total clients are ages 25-44, **28%** are ages 45-64, and **2%** are ages 60 and up.

CLIENT SATISFACTION: This program provides residents with the best possible opportunity of achieving and maintaining **permanent sobriety**. For this year, **88%** of residents indicated program quality as high. Most residents reported that staff treated them with **respect** and **dignity**, making residents more likely to recommend services to family and friends in need.

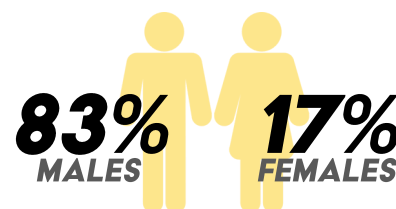

SOBERING CENTER

Sobering Center worked with **California Highway Patrol, Salinas Police Department, Seaside Police Department, Soledad Police Department, Monterey County Sheriff, and Carmel Police Department** to help non-violent offenders avoid jail and receive the care they need, to begin their sobriety on the right foot. Out of total clients served at the Sobering Center, **55%** were between the ages of 25-45 years old. Based on client demographics, **39%** of clients were from the Salinas area and **24%** were visiting Monterey County.

WHOLE PERSON CARE (WPC) Pilot Program is authorized under California's Medi-Cal 2020 waiver to test locally based initiatives that will coordinate physical health, behavioral health, and social services for vulnerable Medi-Cal beneficiaries (homeless/chronically homeless) who are high users of multiple systems and continue to have or are at risk of poor health outcomes.

This program works with individuals who have two or more of the characteristics:

- **diagnosed mental illness**
- **diagnosed substance use disorder**
- **emergency department visits within the prior 12-months**
- **one or more hospitalization within prior 12-months**

PREVENTION DEPARTMENT

The **Prevention Department** is dedicated to building healthy and safe communities by providing a variety of services to **community members** and their **families**, in order to build awareness and promote action around **drug and alcohol abuse**. This department served a total of **6,615** people with locations in the Peninsula, Salinas and South County. With every prevention site focusing on **pressing issues** in their communities, there is a **STEPS Program** and the **PARTS Coalition** take a county-wide approach; focusing on efforts that are impacting our community as a whole.



STEPS PROGRAM: The STEPS programs have always been active in each prevention site. However, with COVID-19 restricting in-person services, the STEPS program went all virtual; making it accessible to **133 students** throughout the county. With one meeting for all county-wide STEPS, students participated in making drug and alcohol prevention flyers, videos, and social media posts about the risks of alcohol, tobacco, marijuana and prescription drug abuse. A total of **14 STEPS** completed Life Skills Training and **40** were trained to co-facilitate Gateway Drug Presentations

PARTS COALITION: Similar to the STEPS Program, the PARTS Coalition from Salinas, Peninsula and South County, merged together to create a single **county-wide coalition**. This coalition meets once a month to discuss **community problems** related to drugs and alcohol, members receive numerous **trainings** from community partners, and exchange **information** and **resources** to better serve our communities. PREVENTION PENINSULA



Peninsula Prevention proudly served 2,441 people (**41% male, 43% female, and 3% other**) through various forms of educational services. This site worked with **2,127 students and parents** through Life Skills Training, Gateway Drug Presentation, Drugged Driving Presentation and Cannabis Decoded Training. **314 people** were served through other community projects. Some of the schools that this prevention site worked with to provide presentations are; **Seaside High School, Marina High School, Monterey High School, Carmel High School, Seaside Middle School, Walter Colton Middle School, International School of Monterey and Dual Language Academy of the Monterey Peninsula.**

GATEWAY DRUG PRESENTATIONS: Youth served through the Gateway Drug presentation makes up for about **68%** of total people served for this prevention site. Youth participants learn the **dangers and risks** of using alcohol, tobacco/e-cigarettes, marijuana and prescription medications including how they affect the **development of the brain**. This gives students the facts about drugs and a question and answer session for questions they may have.

The impact and **positive response** from students about the prevention of youth substance use was outstanding that **City of Seaside** made the decision to support this prevention site to give STEPS volunteers the opportunity for employment through the STEPS program.





PREVENTION SALINAS

Salinas Prevention proudly served 1,336 people through various forms of educational services. This site worked with community partners and schools to serve **737 students and parents** through Life Skills Training (LST), Gateway Drug Presentation, Drugged Driving Presentation and Cannabis Decoded Training. **599 people** were served through other community projects. Some of the schools that this prevention site worked with to provide presentations are; **Notre Dame High School, Alisal High School, Salinas High School, El Sausal Middle School and Washington Middle School.**

RX DRUGS AND MARIJUANA YOUTH FOCUS GROUP: In a focus group conducted by Prevention staff to collect data, youth expressed that even though **prescription drugs** are easily accessible, youth do not perceive them as harmful, rather, they consider marijuana use and vaping as a top issue. For the most part, there is a consensus on **marijuana** being easily accessible and youth **perception** of harm is decreasing, emphasizing the fact that some school administrators see cellphone use as a bigger offense than using marijuana products.



Despite the challenges from COVID-19, **youth engagement** through the STEPS program remained **outstanding** with **96** STEPS volunteers from different high schools in City of Salinas.

PREVENTION SOUTH COUNTY



South County Prevention proudly served 2,838 people through various forms of educational services. This site worked with community partners and schools to serve **716 students and parents** through Life Skills Training (LST), Gateway Drug Presentation, Drugged Driving Presentation and Cannabis Decoded Training. **2,122 people** were served through other community projects. Some of the schools that this prevention site worked with to provide presentations are; **Greenfield High School, Soledad High School, Pinnacles High School, Portola High School, King City High School, and Soledad Main Street Middle School.**

POLICY CHANGE: In partnership with **Monterey County Health Department Tobacco Control Program**, South County Prevention helped push **Tobacco Retail Licensing** to strengthen tobacco regulations with the goal of preventing youth tobacco use initiation and reducing youth tobacco sales.

Another success, after 10 years of the **Social Host Ordinance (SHO)** being enacted in **King City**, an Amendment to the existing SHO was enacted, now including marijuana and illicit drugs. This ordinance prohibits minors from drinking alcohol, using marijuana and illicit drugs at private home gatherings.

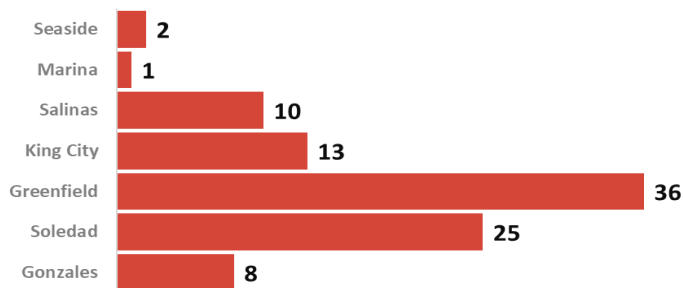

Road to Success worked with law enforcement agencies, juvenile probation, and schools in South County to generate referrals. Based on number of referrals received this past year, staff worked with 95 youth (**83% male** and **17% female**) that were offenders of misdemeanor crimes. Diversion plans were developed in collaboration with the student, their parents and a case management specialist with the goal of offering a path to success through education, community involvement, Life Skills Training, and pro-social activities.

Based on referral source, the top three documented offenses for the youth were; **Truancy** (23 offenders), **Possession of Drugs/Alcohol/Drug Paraphernalia** (22 offenders) and **Driving Without a License/Hit and Run** (14 offenders). In addition, 39 offenders were from Juvenile Hall, however information about their offense was unavailable to us.

COMMUNITY ACCOUNTABLE BOARD, made up of community advocates, held meetings in Soledad, Gonzales, Greenfield and King City to review the reasons the offender committed the offense, discuss the impact, and formulate a diversion agreement, as well as congratulate successful program graduates.
