PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS 2021-2022



INTRODUCTION

Successes we are most proud of:

Enclosed are our program highlights for our fiscal year July 2021-June 2022. I am most proud of our client overall program satisfaction surveys that continue to score in the high 90+ percentiles. This year, physical and mental health improvements are slightly lower than normal in the 75%-85% indicating the impact of the pandemic over two years and its effect on families and program services. Clients are asking for more physical activity and family interaction, curtailed by Covid-19 limitation. Others are leaving program earlier than recommended to care for family needs.



We served nearly 9,000 people this year – 6,000 in Prevention with youth in 26 schools, 1,600 in DUI Education, and 1,400 in Treatment and Recovery Services. 65% of the 9,000 people we served were children, 47% of our clients were Hispanic, 34% lived in Salinas, 32% on the Monterey Peninsula, 82% of the people we served lived at or below the county poverty rate. We collaborated with 479 organizations, including 38 schools. We served a diverse group of community members, mirroring our local demographics.

Our many audits are all 'clean' with minimal corrective actions needed, and our finances are strong. We currently have grown to 165 amazing staff members and 14 program sites in three counties – Monterey, San Benito, and San Luis Obispo.

Client Success Rates: What success means to us - clients meet the goals they set for themselves including leaving program 'clean and sober', entering long term recovery, completing education classes, logging community service hours, changing unhealthy behaviors and attitudes, finding permanent housing and employment, and reuniting with families.

Impact: Reduced alcoholism, addiction, homelessness, deaths by overdose or vehicular, incarcerations and entry into juvenile hall. Increased recovery, family values, community values, and healthy living.





AGENCY - WIDE DATA


During the 2021-2022 Fiscal Year, Sun Street Centers served 8,977 clients. 11% were served in Recovery Programs, 3% were served by the Sobering Center, 18% were served by DUI, and 2% were served in Youth Pre-Diversion. The remaining 66% were served through the Prevention Programs. 1,045 clients were reporting as monolingual Spanish-speakers, while 747 (82% of Recovery Services) clients were reported as living below poverty level.



COLLABORATIONS & VOLUNTEERS

Each year, Sun Street Centers counts the number of inter-agency collaborations. as a requirement for one of its funding sources. Through these cooperative activities, Sun Street Centers not only shares its resources and expertise with other agencies, it also receives comparable, low-cost/high quality support from them and, thereby, expands its ability to serve its own clients. This past year, we were part of 479 collaborations.

A total of 23,021 volunteer hours were completed through community activities, 570 volunteer hours were donated to agency activities, and our board and volunteer committees completed 356 volunteer hours.

PUEBLO DEL MAR FAMILY RECOVERY CENTER



The Family Recovery Program at Pueblo del Mar (PDM) works with Monterey County Behavioral Health, Housing Authority for the County of Monterey, and Monterey County Department of Social Services to provide a safe, affordable, transitional housing program for homeless women with children, men with children, and families with children.

Pueblo Del Mar proudly served 171 clients with 65% of enrolled families successfully completing the program, finding a job, returning to school, and obtaining permanent housing.

Residents are provided opportunities that support their recovery from substance use disorder by participating in training programs and other services that promote self-sufficiency for themselves and their families. Many of the services are provided by onsite community agencies such as; Blue Zones Project, CASA of Monterey County, Center for Employment Training, Coalition of Homeless Service Providers, Department of Social Services, Marina Police Department, MILPA, Young People in Recovery, Monterey Peninsula Unified School District, Soil Cycle Monterey Bay, Door to Hope, City of Marina Recreation Department, Mentor Mom's and Dad's, Parents As Teachers and Scholl & Co.



OUTPATIENT/ COUNSELING



King City Outpatient Team

Outpatient Recovery Services proudly served 292 clients (71% male and 29% female) with 70% of clients between the ages of 25-45 years old. This program empowers men, women and youth (12-17 years old) to stop the cycle of addiction and take charge of their lives. Participants are provided group and individual sessions and services. Counseling services for couples and families are also available. Our Outpatient offices are located in Salinas, King City, Marina and Seaside.



Using the evidence-based Matrix Program, adult and youth clients take part in a comprehensive, evidence-based, individualized program with more than twenty years of research and development by the Matrix Institute of Addictions, an affiliate of the UCLA Integrated Substance Abuse Programs.

DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE EDUCATION PROGRAM



This program is licensed by the State of California Department of Health Care Services (DHCS), Substance Use Disorder Compliance Division, and Driving Under the Influence Unit to provide quality education and counseling to help the participant understand his/her relationship with alcohol and drugs, and the inherent risk of driving while under the influence.

The DUI Education program proudly served 1,635 clients (82% male, 18% female) with 50% of the clients being between ages 25-45 years old. The majority of the clients served (50 %) reside in the area of Salinas. Overall, 74% of clients successfully completed the program. Our DUI offices are located in Salinas, Soledad and Seaside.

SALINAS:

Salinas DUI location served 992 clients (82% male, 18% female) and 54% of clients were 25-45 years old. 74% identify as Hispanic with 78% of all clients residing in the Salinas area. 57% successfully completed the program.

98% reported they were treated with dignity and respect.95% reported a great overall evaluation of the program.

SOLEDAD:

Soledad DUI location served 309 clients (88% male, 12% female) and 52% of clients were 25-45 years old. 81% identify as Hispanic with 59% of all clients residing in the South County area.

72% successfully completed the program.

99% reported they were treated with dignity and respect. 99% reported a great overall evaluation of the program.

SALINAS MEN'S RESIDENTIAL



Men's Residential Program in Salinas proudly served 301 residents, filling up 93% of 55 beds available throughout the year. Resident demographics show that 62% are 25-45 years old, 50% identify as Hispanic and 41% as Caucasian/White, and half of total residents are from the Salinas Area. The top substances that residents considered to be their "primary drug of choice" or preferred drug are 34%


Alcohol, 34% Opioids and 29% Stimulants.






HOLLISTER WOMEN'S RESIDENTIAL



The women's residential program in San Benito County, located in downtown Hollister, proudly served 58 residents. 59% of residents are between 24-45 years old and 86% identify as Caucasian/white. This program provides a supportive environment for single women and women with small children seeking a life free from the devastating effects of drug and alcohol addiction. Our program is somewhat unique in that we serve pregnant women, and children 5 and under may stay with their mother while she is in treatment.

Certified counselors and recovery participants incorporate the principles of Social Model recovery, which utilize a peer-oriented, mutual help system that views the participant as a student, not a patient. Residents attend 12-step meetings, get a sponsor, and take personal responsibility for their own recovery.



Residents completed a total of 86 hours of community service at the San Benito County Food Bank.

The primary drug of choice, based on residents responses; 36% Stimulants, 33% Opioids and 31% Alcohol.

This program reported at least 71% of beds filled throughout the year with 97% of residents indicating that quality of the program as high and 56% of residents successfully completing the program. The great leadership from staff and the determination from residents to stay alcohol and drug-free created a safe environment for the women to get on the road to sobriety.

KING CITY RESIDENTIAL



The men and women's residential program in King City proudly served 91 residents. This program provides a supportive environment for men and women who are seeking freedom from the devastating effects of drug and alcohol addiction.

Residents received on-site supportive services from Monterey County Behavioral Health, MILPA, Goodwill Central Coast, and Housing Resource Center of Monterey County to help enhance their skill sets.

In addition, residents completed a total of 2,458 hours of community service by working alongside Salinas Rodeo, King City in Bloom, King City Fair, Sol Treasures and Monterey County Food Bank.

The Primary drug of choice for this program is based on residents responses; 44% Stimulants, 34% Alcohol, and 21% Opioids.

WOMEN:

King City Women's Residential program served 32 women, filling up the 8 beds available throughout the year. 72% of the women were between the ages of 25-45 years old and 63% identified as Hispanic.

MEN:

King City Men's Residential program served 59 men, filling up the 12 beds available throughout the year. 68% of the men were between the ages of 25-45 years old and 54% identified as Hispanic.

SOBERING CENTER



Our Compassionate Team at the Sobering Center

Sobering Center is a safe alternative to incarceration when arrested while intoxicated. Non-violent offenders can avoid jail and receive the care they need and then receive a ride home. This center proudly served 284 clients (70% male, 29% female and 1% other) with 56% being between ages 25-45 years old and 69% identifying themselves as Hispanic.

This fiscal year, Sobering Center received referrals from partnering agencies like California Highway Patrol, Pacific Grove Police Department, Salinas Police Department, Seaside Police Department, Marina Police Department, Soledad Police Department, Carmel Police Department, and Monterey County Sheriff's Department to help non-violent offenders avoid jail and receive the care they need.

PREVENTION: PENINSULA



Prevention Team on the Monterey Peninsula

Peninsula Prevention proudly served 3,568 people (41% male, 38% female, 4% other, and 17% unreported) through various forms of educational services. This site provided 45 student trainings and 5 parent trainings about Gateway Drugs. A total of 1,588 students and 31 parents learned about the dangers of popular gateway drugs, how they mentally and physically affect the developing body, and the risk associated with substance abuse. In addition, other educational presentations were provided to the community such as; Evidence-based Life Skills Training for youth and parents, Substance Abuse and Bullying for parents and youth, Cannabis Decoded for parents and Drugged Driving for high school students.

PREVENTION: SALINAS



Salinas Prevention proudly served 1,386 people (25% male, 42% female, 6% other, and 27%

unreported) through various forms of educational services. 'Collaboration is key' - this site approached educational efforts by also collaborating with a total of 65 different community entities/groups (45% local nonprofit agencies). Working alongside community partners that have a mission that aligns with ours, helps us reach a different group of individuals. Some groups that this site partnered with are;



This site provided 27 trainings for youth and parents about Gateway Drugs, Life Skills Training, Cannabis Decoded and Drugged Driving. A total of 753 students and parents learned about the dangers of popular gateway drugs, how they mentally and physically affect the developing body, and the risk associated with substance abuse.

In addition, this site used media outlets to share information about drugs and alcohol, prevention campaigns and efforts, and current projects that community volunteers can be part of. A total of 231 media engagements were made with community members using platforms such as Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, TikTok, Radio, Newspaper/Print, and monthly email blasts.

PREVENTION: SOUTH COUNTY



Prevention Staff and STEPS Youth Leaders from South Monterey County

South Monterey County Prevention proudly served 928 people (36% male, 40% female and 24% unreported) through various forms of educational services. This site provided 32 Youth Life Skills Trainings to 301 students to help enhance their skills and reduce their risk of substance use. Botvin Life Skills Training (LST) is a research-validated substance abuse prevention program proven to reduce the risks of alcohol, tobacco, drug abuse, and violence by targeting the major social and psychological factors that promote the initiation of substance use and other risky behaviors. This training is a highly interactive program that incorporates many activities addressing all of the most important factors that are scientifically proven to promote health and personal development. Additional trainings provided include; 28 student trainings (Gateway Drugs, Drugged Driving and Substance Abuse and Bullying) to 494 students and 6 parent trainings (Gateway Drugs and Cannabis Decoded) to 51 parents.


South Monterey County Prevention staff worked closely with a total of 141 STEPS Youth Leaders from Soledad High School, Greenfield High School and Portola Butler High School. This made up 61% of total STEPS Youth Leaders served from all around Monterey County. STEPS is lead by staff and student council leaders representing local public high schools. The STEPS Program aims to reduce alcohol-related traffic injuries and deaths. It focuses on teen drinking, driving under the influence, and initiated tobacco usage by minors.



ROAD TO SUCCESS: YOUTH PRE-DIVERSION



Road to Success worked with law enforcement agencies, juvenile probation, and schools in South Monterey County to generate referrals. Staff worked with 202 youth (74% male and 26% female) that were offenders of misdemeanor crimes. Diversion plans were developed in collaboration with the student, their parents and a case management specialist with the goal of offering a path to success through education, community involvement, Life Skills Training, and pro-social activities. 62% of youth successfully completed the program, completing a total of 1,338 community service hours and 1,452 hours or pro-social activities with a 0% recidivism rate compared to the 10% from the prior year. This program is proudly supported by Proposition 64, California Violence Intervention and Prevention (CalVIP) Grant by the Board of State and Community Corrections (BSCC), and local donors like Enza-Zaden.




COMMUNITY ACCOUNTABILITY BOARD is made up of community advocates, held meetings in King City, Greenfield, Gonzales and Seaside to review the reasons the youth offender committed the offense, discuss the impact, and formulate a diversion agreement, as well as congratulate the successful program graduates.

SOBER LIVING ENVIRONMENTS: SALINAS



The men and women's Sober Living Environments (SLE) in Salinas proudly served 28 residents. 68% of them reside in the Salinas area. This program provides a safe, clean, structured recovery environment, dedicated to providing supportive and affordable sober living. Our SLE's are structured to implement everything our residents have acquired in treatment, through the twelve-step recovery process. Residents share responsibilities and pay their own way.

The top substances that residents considered to be their "primary drug of choice" or preferred drug prior to entering recovery are 43% meth, 25% alcohol and 18% heroin.

WOMEN:

Salinas Women's SLE program served 9 women, occupying 81% of beds available throughout the year. 56% of the women were between the ages of 25-45 years old and 44% identified as Caucasian/White.



MEN:

Salinas Men's SLE program served 19 men, occupying 90% of beds available throughout the year. 53% of the men were between the ages of 25-45 years old and 68% identified as Hispanic.

100% of clients reported the program was helpful to them and their sobriety. 100% of clients reported improvements in relationships with family/friends.





SOBER LIVING ENVIRONMENTS: HOLLISTER




The men and women's Sober Living Environments (SLE) in Hollister proudly served 29 residents. This program provides residents with the best possible opportunity of achieving and maintaining long-term sobriety. Residents agree to a Sober Living Covenant designed to develop character, self-esteem, responsibility, self-reliance, and accountability in order to help in the process of rebuilding a life.

The top substances that residents considered to be their "primary drug of choice" or preferred drug prior to entering recovery are 17% heroin, 21% alcohol and 55% methamphetamine.

WOMEN:

Hollister Women's SLE program served 14 women, occupying 94% of beds available throughout the year. 71% of the women were between the ages of 25-45 years old and 86% identified as Caucasian/White.



MEN:


Hollister Men's SLE program served 15 men, occupying 96% of beds available throughout the year. 87% of the men were between the ages of 25-45 years old and 53% identified as Caucasian/White.

SOBER LIVING ENVIRONMENTS: KING CITY



The men and women's Sober Living Environments (SLE) in King City proudly served 4 residents last year. In August 2022, Huntington House opened for men and women ready to move in. This program provides a safe, clean, structured recovery environment, dedicated to providing supportive and affordable sober living. Residents agree to a Sober Living Covenant designed to develop character, self-esteem, responsibility, self-reliance, and accountability in order to help in the process of rebuilding a life.

Program residents represent different areas of San Benito County and Monterey County. 50% are from Salinas and 50% from South County.

The top substances that residents considered to be their "primary drug of choice" or preferred drug prior to entering recovery are 50% opioids, 25% alcohol and 25% stimulants.

WOMEN:

King City Women's SLE program served 3 women, occupying 100% of beds available throughout the year. 67% of the women were between the ages of 25-45 years old and 67% identified as Caucasian/White.



MEN:

King City Men's SLE program served 1 man, occupying 50% of beds available throughout the year. The resident was between the ages of 46-64 years old and identified as Hispanic.
